We really enjoyed the performance of The Elves and The Shoemaker that we saw at West Acre Theatre; we thought that it was really funny when the shoemaker measured Mrs Dunkley's feet and said that they were size smelly! We have enjoyed making Christmas candles for the tree and Christmas decorations for class. Swaffham Community Fridge;

Based in Swaffham Community Centre, this is a drop-in service where you can access food. Here is an extract from their blog;

If you don't already know, the idea of the community fridge is to prevent perfectly edible food from going to landfill. Supermarkets that would otherwise have to dispose of food past its sell by date donate it to us instead and we safely redistribute it to the community.

There still seem to be several misconceptions surrounding the concept, such as the belief that it is a form of food bank and only available to those on a low income or in special need of help. The fridge is open to absolutely anyone in the community. As long as it means food isn't being wasted, we welcome everyone.


We also do not require monetary donations, but if you have any spare store cupboard items, we will happily accept suitable food donations to redistribute via the fridge or we will give them to other local agencies that may be in need.

We hope this helps clear things up a little and welcome you to pop by and see what's on offer.

Thank you for supporting your child's attendance at school every day. We have adopted the local authority attendance policy (see attached) and want to remind everyone that the target is 97% - not because we get any praise or issues if the target is achieved or not, but because we know that children who are in school 96% of the time or more have the best advantages in education and we want that for ALL our children.
