In her absence, we have had super support from Mrs Jary and Mrs Marshall, who are covering her until her return. The children know both adults very well, as Mrs Jary teaches them on a Thursday afternoon for Science and Mrs Marshall, who is a very experienced Early Years Practitioner, has been listening to readers in Hedgehogs and supporting other activities around the school for many years. Mrs Jary works with us in the mornings and Mrs Marshall works with us in the afternoons. Since returning from Christmas, we have been very excited to share all of our holiday news and Christmas presents. We have been having a great time learning about fairy tales in English, listening to a variety of old favourites, joining in with the repeating phrases and all living happily ever after! We will use our knowledge of fairy tales, especially Jack and the Beanstalk, to write our own fairy tale over the next two weeks. In Maths, Reception have been using measuring skills to make their own playdough and Year 1 have been working with adding numbers by counting on or using number bonds. We will use this to help us with subtraction next. Our new learning in Science is about plants, and we have had good fun searching for different plants, using a key to help us identify them. I 'accidently' threw some magic beans out of the window earlier in the week and the children are super excited to see if they grow into a beanstalk – they seem to have already started growing!

This week, we have begun to look at newspapers. We have learned what newspapers are, what they report on and how a report is structured on the page. The children enjoyed playing fastest finger to identify the features in different newspaper examples. We are learning about Grace Darling in History, and Henry Blogg, as examples of historical figures who have done heroic deeds in the dangerous seas. This learning will be informing the content of our newspaper stories. It has been a fantastic week and a half back with great learning behaviours and we look forward to another fantastic week ahead.

In English we started our topic with a dramatic reading of the poem 'The Spider and The Fly'. I have been so impressed with the character voices and dramatic faces the children have used as they read. As we continue our work with 'The Spider and The Fly' in English, we will take a deep dive into sentence demarcation, including speech marks, commas and full stops. In Maths the children have started brilliantly, showing a solid understanding of factors and factor pairs. They have also been showing off by multiplying by 10 and 100. Next week, we will look at dividing by 10 and 100 before moving onto written methods of multiplication.

Otters

Otters have had yet another busy week! In Maths, the Year 5s have been learning about equivalent fractions, whilst the Year 6s have been applying their knowledge of equivalent fractions to simplify and compare fractions. In English, we have been exploring how to use expression and different voices to perform a poem whilst also exploring the author's choice of language. In Geography, we have begun our mountains, volcanoes and earthquake topic and have explored the structure of the earth and plate tectonics. In Science, we have identified different forces acting upon objects and explored how the forces affect the object.

Message from the Executive Headteacher:

Pupil Voice from the Autumn;

As you know, each half-term we talk to our children about their time in school and ask their opinions. Last term we asked about learning, about how much they enjoy reading, about bullying and mean moments and about whether the children felt safe in school. We had super responses, which really gave us a good knowledge of our children's views and feelings.

When we asked about their learning, the children gave so many positive comments about a whole range of subjects and units of learning. For example, 'I love learning about India because I love the animals (that) live there', 'I like learning sounds', 'I like learning everything because it is fun', I love drawing maps because they are my favourite' and 'I like Maths because I get to use blocks, number lines and maths equipment' 'I love the Maths challenges and using resources' 'I enjoy that we get to do partner work' 'I like learning because I love reading and writing' 'I like Science experiments' 'I like Maths because I like using long multiplication' 'I like PE because I enjoy sports' 'I enjoy Maths because it's really fun' 'I enjoy swimming because I like learning new strokes' and 'I like Art because it's enjoyable and fun'. There were so many lovely comments that show our children are really enjoying their learning and curriculum, and the same was true of reading, with children talking about reading helping you in your learning, being fun and making you smarter.

Children felt that there was no discrimination. Some children found this a hard concept, thinking more about mean moments so more work on that will follow over time.

100% of children said that there was no bullying, and that if anything did happen (a couple could talk about mean moments) then a teacher would help you. All children said that they felt safe in school because of our staff and our fences. One Reception child said in response to this question that they didn't know, so this was followed up.

Overall, this was an incredibly positive and pleasing survey. There were one or two individual things to follow up, such as explaining discrimination further and one child who didn't feel they had enough variety of books to read, which staff are working on.

This term, we will be talking about online safety as we approach Safer Internet Day in February.

Keeping children safe online:

This can be such a daunting task and one that worries all parents I talk to about it and me too.

Top Tips from the NSPCC include:

Listen to what they have to say and show an interest. They could give you a demo of their favourite app or show you their favourite YouTube or TikTok account.

They will probably be able to teach you things you don't know! This will also give you an opportunity to chat about any safety settings they might already have in place.

Regular conversations with your child will encourage them to come to you if they ever need support or advice.

If your child asks you a question you don't know the answer to, or speaks to you about a negative experience they had online, here are some of things you could do: Visit the NSPCC online safety hub: nspcc.org.uk/onlinesafety
