Message from the Executive Headteacher:

Safeguarding; Omegle

Omegle is becoming popular again, and the lack of safeguarding for children using it is very frightening. Did you know Omegle has a 'Spy' function, where someone anonymous can hover in a conversation and view replies? They can also ask someone to tell them something posing as someone else.

A <u>BBC investigation</u> found sexually explicit videos and live streams involving minors as young as 7 or 8 which spread across the site during the Covid-19 pandemic. BBC alerted the relevant authorities. However, there is still a risk of users unexpectedly coming across inappropriate content including explicit materials.
